

Tips on how to design your Baggies

The simplest badges nearly always provide the best looking caps. All of the County sides we supply caps to, Yorkshire, Lancashire, Derbyshire, Nottinghamshire, Leicestershire and Glamorgan, all remove text from their badges on the caps.

The caps can only be clamped during embroidery, just above the peak. As the needle penetrates the fabric at typically, 750 times per minute, it is pushing and pulling the fabric around, whilst trying to attach the thread to embroider the badge. This is not ideal for small intricate designs, including small text.

The actual embroidery area on caps is approximately 60mm. When looking at your badge to see how it looks on caps, reduce the image to 60mm for a more accurate size of the image to be embroidered.

Here is an example: We were sent this badge by Buxton CC to go on a cap.



After much discussion, the club agreed that just the leaping buck would look better on the caps. This was the result and finished cap. A very simple and striking looking cap.



The badge on the shirts can be clamped all around the area to be embroidered and can be a much bigger working area. The caps supplement the shirts and so the badge doesn't have to be an exact replica of the shirts/jumpers etc. The club colours are the actual cap, so is the text necessary?

In our experience, we would normally recommend removing all text from the badge to go on caps but it is your club, your caps and your decision. We are happy to work with you to provide you with what you want.

Hope this information gets you thinking about your caps and helps to produce a stunning end result.

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
